Líons Club to Collect Canned Goods for South County Food Pantry

Antietam Unit 236, Sharpsburg American Legion Auxiliary President Ava Gift, on behalf of unit members, presented a blue start banner at their August unit meeting to Michael and Teresa Swiger and son Kevin. The Swiger's older son, Christopher, is serving with the United States Army "Big Red One", stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas, as an unmanned aircraft system repairer.

Christopher graduated from Boonsboro Senior High School in 2004. He comes from a military background – his father was a member of the Martinsburg Air National Guard, maternal grandfather Gene Milburn was a member of the Army National Guard and paternal grandfather Frank Shiflett an Air Force veteran who served in the Korean War.

Created in 1917, Blue Star Service Banners were a common site during WWI and WWII. Resurrected by the Legion in 2001, the banner is displayed to show that a family member is currently serving in the Armed Forces.

Antietam Unit 236 Earns Awards



Past President Marilyn Hembrock presented Antietam Unit 236 with Certificate of Merit awards on September 22 at the Western Maryland District American Legion Auxiliary meeting.

The Unit received first place for Americanism, Blood Donor Program, Children & Youth, Community Service, Gold Star, Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation, Poppy, Junior Activities and All Around Activities.

In addition, at the annual American Legion Auxiliary convention in Ocean City, Maryland, the unit received first place for Cancer Control – Most Outstanding Work, Children & Youth – Most Outstanding Work, Gold Star, Legislative – Best All Around Report, national Security and Best All Around Program.

The Unit received second place for Americanism – Most Outstanding Work, Education, Public Relations – Most Complete Publicity Report, Public Relations – Best All Around Work, and Past President's Parley – Best All Around Activities.

BATTLEFIELD ADVISORY COMMITTEE



- To operate within its limited funding, in late August, Antietam Battlefield permanently reassigned five staff members to other parks. By the end of 2013, the battlefield will have taken a 20 percent staff loss: the permanent staff will have declined from forty positions to thirty-two positions, within a six month period
- About forty people attended the public open house on the White-Tailed Deer management Plan and Environmental Impact study, held in the Antietam Visitor Center on August 27. There were thirty attendees at a similar open house at Manassas and fifteen at Monocacy. The management plan presents four options and the Antietam Battlefield staff favors one that could use both lethal and nonlethal methods to reduce the deer population. - The meeting for public comment on the Shepherdstown Battlefield Special Resource Study, scheduled for September 14, has been postponed, tentatively to October 19. If this date remains firm, details about the location and time will be publicized as soon as possible.
