Meet Your Neighbor, Ms. Stephanie Gumm

(This feature article is the next in the series showcasing local volunteers who give of their time and talent in unpaid service to others. In her words... – Editor)

I am a Certified Exit Planning and Financial Planner with Horizon Advisory. We are a team of 6 and based in Reston with offices in Houston, TX and Amelia Island, FL. I have 2 children in college.

About 7 years ago I heard of an organization named Thistle Farms, founded by an Episcopalian minister outside Nashville. Thistle Farms is a recovery home for women of addiction and human trafficking. The more research I did and books I read I became passionate about the issue of human trafficking. Substance abuse and human trafficking often go hand in hand. I interviewed Directors of recovery homes in Baltimore and Charlottesville. I was eager to find a home close to our area where I could be a part of it. I loved the Thistle Farms model because it not only provides therapy and freedom, it incorporates working in a business to give the women the confidence, experience and finances to work and lead healthy lives. Where most recovery centers



have a 67% recidivism rate, 75% of the graduates of Thistle Farms are leading healthy lives 5 years after graduation. After 4 years of prayers and a vision I uncovered Dandelion Meadow based in Lovettsville, VA. I immediately contacted the founder, interviewed with her and the Board, and soon became Vice Chair of the Board. Our endeavor is to open a home using this



model in Loudoun County, VA, the 6th largest county in the country for human trafficking. We are a working Board heavily embedded in the fundraising process. We are seeking a home and land to build businesses, possibly in aquaponics to grow fresh herbs and vegetables year-round, to serve local restaurants, and goat milk cosmetics to sell online. We had a very successful Fashion Social earlier this year, a motorcycle Poker Run led by men and women in recovery, and will host our 2nd golf tournament at Raspberry Falls Golf & Hunt

Club in Leesburg in September. Check us out on Facebook and our website at www.dandelionmeadow.org

My other passion is Love for Children (a St. Paul's Episcopal Church ministry). When we first started our outreach, my immediate place to go to search for who we could help was Sharpsburg Elementary School. I was shocked when I learned of all the children in need. More than that, I was embarrassed that I have lived outside this town for over 20 years and had no idea the need was so great. We immediately went to work providing meals. Our small congregation donated ever so generously. We started with providing meals on the weekends. When the pandemic hit, and there were no school meals, we provided meals 7 days a week for a few months. We asked for help from the Sharpsburg community and they



were eager to help. Local business owners placed boxes in their stores to collect food. Then the county provided a Meal Truck during the summer, so

we went back to weekend meals, but the numbers climbed. We now provide 304 meals a week during the summer and supplement those who need some extra help as needed throughout the year. It is a great team effort with Michael Arant taking the lead with me.


Friendly-we are an open an inclusive community for residents and visitors alike.


Sharpsburg Days 2022: October 1



Mayor & Council of Sharpsburg Meeting Minutes Monday, August 1, 2022 6 PM

I. Call meeting to order and pledge-Mia

Meeting minutes from July reviewed via email, Ed motioned to accept, Jake seconded and all were in favor of accepting the minutes from July.

In attendance: Russ Weaver, Jacob Martz, Ed Beeler, Mia Parsons, Joe Kudla, John Hammond, Tim Lung (via speaker phone), Carrie Estell, Chris Vincent and Jen Bruni.

Public Comments-no public comments this evening.

Mayor's Report

- Finances discussed; budget finalized and July's expenses/income report were discussed. Jake motioned to accept the budget and July's financial report, Ed seconded the motion and all were in favor. John asked questions about specific vendors and amounts paid per job. These specific questions can easily be answered based on specific vendor reports in Quick-Books. Russ reviewed the town's spending policy, (less than 10K no bids/compete needed, reviewed if a cost is an emergency). Fiscal year 23 budget was reviewed with minor changes, some accounts that were overlooked during the budget meeting were added/updates
- Hull Property purchase and process-easement issue should be resolved this week and purchase as soon as title company can schedule.
- Mayor's message to be uploaded on the town's website, instills a small town feel based on experience of Russ and Jake talking to a visitor after the Memorial Day ceremonies. Carrie will edit the home page with the message.
- Water and Sewer information was disbursed and discussed; a fixed rate as opposed to a % of the wells' output is a more negotiable and easier to adjust. Russ will draft up a letter within the next couple of weeks and send out prior to sending to Mark Bradshaw at the county's water quality department.
- Concrete pick up, weeds at little league park, bank parking lot and weeds at Lutheran Cemetery are mostly Johnson grass;
 Russ has someone coming in to spray certain areas of the town and will speak to Robbie concerning the issues addressed.

Zoning-Tim Lung (reported via speaker phone)

- Have received all the information needed from Mr. Fitzgerald regarding the Zoning Permit application for the Short-Term Rental at 110 S. Mechanic Street, owned by Gideon Properties. All of the conditions of the BZA's approval have been addressed. A fire marshal inspection it not necessary because of the small size of the STR.
- Continue to work on the acquisition of the Big Spring lot from the Hull's. There needs to be an additional easement established to accommodate mowing/maintenance equipment to the backside of the lot. Have been discussing options with the Town Attorney and Fred Frederick.
- Issued a 10-day notice of violation for weeds and tall grass on property at 125 W. Main Street. Will be following up next week for compliance.
- Issued a 10-day notice for tall grass/weeds at 121 E. Main Street. Will most likely be issuing a Civil Citation with establishment of a fine. Need to complete documentation and evidence before issuing the citation because there is a likelihood that the matter will end up in court.
- Followed up on a tall grass/weed complaint at 116 E. Main Street. Could not find anything that would constitute a violation. Carrie responded to the complainant.
- Have been corresponding with the County's Director of Permitting and Inspections regarding an on-going drainage issue related to the Storm Water Management facility at the Elementary school. Will most likely need to have a meeting with the WCPS, the County Storm Water Inspector and the complainant in the field. Vacations, etc have presented scheduling challenges.
- The issue regarding the electronic sign at the fire department is unresolved. Negotiations between the parties has broken down. May end up being a civil matter between the complainants and the Fire dept.
- Attended a Planning Commission meeting last Wednesday evening. The Planning Commission reviewed and recommends approval of the alley names discussed with Dave Hays and Ollie Griffith at the April 4 Mayor and Council meeting. Biggs Alley, Tolson Alley, Garrison Springs Alley, and Clipp Alley. The Planning Commission discussed establishing regulation of temporary storage containers (Pods). Reviewed Boonsboro's Ordinance and will make some changes as needed. They also discussed regulation of sea containers as permanent storage buildings and accessory dwelling units. Asked Tim to research

further and present some alternatives. Tim gave the Planning Commission an update on the status of the County Historic District's work on establishing an MOU with the Town's to facilitate the ability of residents to receive tax credits for renovation of historic structures. Tim reviewed with the Planning Commission Boonsboro's 5G Small Cell antenna ordinance. There may have been a deadline established by the FCC regarding municipalities ability to adopt additional guidelines. Tim to look into it with the FCC and also talk to MML and some other Towns regarding regulation and how it may apply to private property.

Will not be in the office this Friday, August 5. Will be in August 12 and 19. Will be out of the office August 26 and Sept 2.

Council comments

- Joe Kudla-streets, roads & culverts
- O Planning to contact Tony Crawford at MDOT about the parking spots to be painted on Main Street and will ask about the historic walls that have brush growing.
- O End of Antietam and Church Street, the entire section needs to be addressed. The work done on the culvert was great but the water issues need to be addressed. Ideally, town to have Fred Fredrick to take a look and do a possible survey and/or make some suggestions. Many of the roads in town are an issue due to an over lay program the county had offered at different times that the town took advantage of. Russ mentioned that milling the roads would be the best fix.
- O John reviewed the sidewalk policy that was drafted after the first two jobs by No Mow Worries were completed.
- → The pros and cons of the policy were discussed and the wording in the ordinance regarding sidewalks are not very specific.
- The sidewalk work that was completed was of good quality; the large area of Antietam in front of the Hull residence, is also a bus stop. High foot traffic and bus stops will be targeted for repair first. Carrie will reach out to the WCPS transportation department and inquire of the bus stops for our middle and high school residents. All elementary school children walk to school.
- → Discussion of Main Street sidewalks were the responsibility of the state as they created a streetscape but implemented with work and materials that have failed over the years. When some of council met with MDOT rep concerning this issue, there was not much confidence that the state would fix.

- O Museum received a new computer and software package for better record keeping and a website is being designed

- O Tree policy was questioned as two trees were removed from Main Street. Russ reviewed the meeting where Mr. Jamison came to council with an issue caused by the trees. Kourtney Lowry of 205 E Main Street reached out; there is a dead tree in front of her house. Carrie will reach out to Antietam Tree & Turf for an estimate and to see if they'll need traffic assistance.
- O Tree replacements are slated for the fall; Mia said she would think about how she will get input from the residents who had trees removed.

Planning commission has requested monies for someone to rewrite the Comprehensive Plan of the town, the renewal/review date is soon.

Electrical estimates-John would like the estimate to be more specific and will call JS Electric to have them update. He also said he would call Shifler Electric too to see about their estimate.


Council furniture-American Design and DSL are working together on configuration for electrical; a non-curved style of desks was voted on in a brown whiskey color.


This lecture will be about the fire fighters, fire apparatus, fire halls and fires since 1796.

The dinner program will start at 7:00pm and is held at St Paul's Episcopal Church, 209 W. Main Street in the parish hall at the back of the church.


