Not only does she ensure the safety "her" kids as they cross, but everyone who drives by gets a wave and that smile you see. "Her" kids? She knows all of them by name and family ties. She stays long enough to see to the safety of the Middle- and High School students as they get on the bus headed for Boonsboro.



We spoke at the crossing after her kids were safely on their way for a pleasant hour on a cold October morning recently.

She mentioned several times that she is the "911" for her family, always available for parents, children, and friends. Helping is her mission in life. There's simply not enough room in this article to catalogue the list, but it includes everything from watching kids to helping parents to laying flooring to picking up things that someone needs for dinner. The Editor leaves it to you to take it up with her, but it is such things that are her role, purpose, and the source of her happiness.



Heather has been with Sharpsburg Elementary School for twelve years, starting in the food preparation operation. By chance, she was available to temporarily fill in for the crossing guard and that was the start. Her parents are nearby. She and her husband Tim have three very independent grown children with a grandchild due in the Spring. Trust me here; she'll tell you all about them.

She'll also tell you all about her love of this small place, her place in it, and the experience of growing up here. "I was surrounded by family...you could go around town safely...we knew everyone...I have been truly blessed."

Mr. Jeff Cline, Washington County Commissioner, conferred a Certificate of Recognition on behalf of the Wash-







Mayor & Council of Sharpsburg Meeting Minutes-DRAFTED Monday, October 3, 2022 6 PM

- I. Call meeting to order and pledge-John led pledge
- II. Minutes and September expenses approval-meeting minutes were motioned by ed, Joe seconded and all were in favor of accepting the minutes; Russ reviewed September financials along with year-to-date budget and Jake motioned and Ed seconded, all were in favor of the financials.

Attendance: Russ Weaver, Jacob Martz, Joe Kudla, Mia Parsons, John Hammond, Ed Beeler, Dave Williams, Jen Bruni, Carrie Estell, Perry Jamieson, and Tim Lung (via speaker phone).

Public Comments

Dave Williams-candidate for County Commission

Mr. Williams gave a brief synopsis of his experience, (45 years in Washington County, 40 years as a public-school librarian), who would like to bring a bipartisan model to the county. This would result in a diversity of though, accountability and a sense of checks and balance is what he seeks in his candidacy. His campaign slogan is "Turn the Page with Washington County Government." He values school and public services including safety. Mr. Jamieson asked about warehouses in the county, Mr. Williams shares Mr. Jamieson's concern and would like a list of facts to have the number of warehouses, their purpose and if they are operating.

Zoning-Tim Lung

Received a zoning variance application from Jenna Smith who is interested in purchasing the vacant lot along South Hall Street behind 120 W. Antietam Street, for the purpose of locating a single-family dwelling. The variance request is a reduction of the minimum 8' side yard setback along the alley to 6'-8". The Board of Zoning Appeals will hear the request at a public hearing on Oct 17 at 7pm at Town Hall. Thanks to Randy, Lauren, and Matt for stepping up to hear this case. The Planning Commission has the option to review the application and forward to the BZA prior to the hearing. If the variance is approved, a building permit will follow. The permit must be reviewed by the Planning Commission. application will be sent.

Have been corresponding with Antietam Broadband regarding their plans for fiber cable infrastructure upgrades in the Town and the requirements for a Utility Permit to be issued by the Town. The Town does not have a Utility Permit application form or permit. I will create them.

The person that inquired about establishing a retail business at the corner of E. Main and S. Mechanic Street in front of Nutters has decided not to pursue this space.

The County issued the building permit for repairs to a garage located at 223 E. main Street.

The unsecured/unsafe structure at 316 W. Main Street was handled by the County building inspector and was corrected.

Have issued several tall grass/weed violation notices. Several properties were mowed.

Finalizing the minutes of the last Planning Commission meeting for the Chairpersons signature. Research several items of concern requested by the Planning Commission for follow up and discussion at a future meeting.

Will not be in the office on Friday the 7 and Friday the 14th but will be able to respond to emails if needed.
