

The Story of St. Paul's Episcopal Church: It's Really All About The Town

When we look closely at anything in our lives we find it to be linked to everything else. So it is with St. Paul's. Its story only exists as part of the story of the Maryland Colony, the Town, State, and Nation.

It's even related to the history of the settlers in Cumberland Valley and the contest for control by the French and their Indian allies (The French and Indian War). We won't delve too deeply into that. There are historians who make the case that the very founding of the town depended on the withdrawal of the French threat. Perhaps another time.

At any rate, the Episcopal Movement, post Revolution in the United States, arises from its Church of England roots. To this day, the liturgies are nearly identical. The earliest Church of England presence we have is the Chapel said to have stood on the nearby Joseph Chapline (the founder's) plantation. The continued Chapline influence on St. Paul's is obscured by time, but there is compelling evidence that they were important, as you will read.

It's important to understand that the Episcopal Community in Sharpsburg preceded the construction of the first Episcopal church structure.

The Episcopal Community: The first organizer of the Episcopal Community that local history records is The Reverend Benjamin Allen, from St. Andrews Parish, Shepherdstown, in 1815. The local Lutherans already had a church building and opened their doors to the Epis-

copal community. This began a deep cooperation between these denominations throughout their existence. In 1820, the Episcopal community was recognized by the Maryland Episcopal Diocesan Convention.

The First Episcopal Church: The Chapline family sold the church plot for a nominal sum, the traditional English custom. They charged a peppercorn. The cornerstone was laid in 1819. A description of the building survives, it was, "rough cut stone, 50 ft. east-facing tower, with belfry, plaster, 100 ft. from street". There are no known early images of it, but by fortuitous chance, images were captured forty-three years later, two days after

the Battle of Antietam, by Alexander Gardner². These two images are part of our treasured history.

The next decades provide the usual account of a church, then and now. There were periods of growth and decline; sometimes they struggled to keep a rector. No account of this period can go forth without the story of the "Chapline Bell". The story goes that it was donated to the

church by the founder's daughter-in-law, Mary Ann Christian Abigail Ferguson Chapline. It is thought to have been cast in England and it's a good story for another Town Crier feature. When you hear the Chapline Bell at 10AM of a Sunday, it's the oldest town voice you will hear, all the way back to the Colonial Era³.

Shadow of War: Sharpsburg was a loyal town on the border with the Confederacy, two miles away. Though loyal, there was a strong secessionist presence here. There were ill feelings; hostile words; burned barns. Into this stepped St. Paul's Rector, The Reverend John A. Adams. Here we must face an inconvenient truth; he was a slave owner. The 1860 Slave Record records John A. Adams as owning seven slaves, ages 5 to 70, male and female. You will hear in the second installment of this story, Adams' St. Paul's experience in the aftermath of the battle. His voice is that of a broken man. Other histories record that his wife fell into depression, too.

September 14, 1862 was a Sunday. One can easily imagine the Reverend Adams preaching the Sunday Service. In that moment, the War was widely understood through the newspapers and by some firsthand accounts. The course of the War was going badly; the first

Peninsular Campaign had failed; another battle at Manassas added to the toll. Now, with those with eyes to see, it was distressingly obvious that Robert Lee had invaded. Whole Confederate divisions were moving up and down the town and valley roads. Some described them as "hungry as wolves". They were asking for food…and then they weren't asking.

Back to Reverend Adams and the Sunday Service. As the congregation sat there, they heard the 'whump-whump" of far-away artillery. They heard the distant crackle of musket fire. After the service they went out on the lawn and saw white smoke rise out of Turner Gap six miles away, above Boonsboro. Though hidden by Red Hill, the same sound was heard on the far ridge all the way to Harpers Ferry to the south. It was the Battle of South Mountain. Soon after, both the Army of Northern Virginia and the Army of the Potomac⁴ were in dangerous proximity of one another here in Cumberland Valley.

Many, perhaps most, congregants left town, some congregated at the Reverend Adams farm, known in our time as the Myers Farm. Congregant James Snyder was there and later wrote "A large number of refugees were already congregated and the house and even the barns and stables were full of apprehensive and terrified people."

It is thought by some historians that Lee only chose Sharpsburg Ridge on which to achieve the Confederacy's goals at the last minute, a pure chance of war.

For St. Paul's and the town, WAR WAS UP-ON THEM.

(The next Town Crier begins with the day of the battle and continues to the present.)

¹ - The Lutheran church was rendered unusable after the disaster of the Battle of Antietam. It was hurriedly rebuilt at its present location, but soon collapsed. St. Paul's opened its doors for Lutheran services. In 1943, the Lutheran

Church burned. Again, St. Paul's opened its doors.

- ² Gardner had a US Government contract to provide photographic accounts of the Civil War.
- ³ The Chapline Bell stood in the original church but was buried during the Civil War. The bronze metal was highly prized by all sides of the conflict. Any bronze bell could be melted down and re-cast as howitzer barrels. (Aside: There are accounts of Napoleon cannons ringing like a bell as the projectile was fired!) You'll read next month about the bell's resurrection into the belfry of the rebuilt church. In the late 1800s, the bell needed to be re-cast.
- ⁴ The Federal Army of the Potomac in that moment was likely the largest army in the Western Hemisphere.



Fire Company Looking for Fire Police







The Mayor and Council of Sharpsburg, MD held their monthly meeting on Monday, February 5, 2024 in the Council meeting room of Town Hall located at 106 E. Main Street in Sharpsburg. In attendance were Mayor Russell Weaver, Vice Mayor Jacob Martz, Councilmembers Ed Beeler, Joseph Kudla, John Hammond and Mia Parsons and Robbie Waters. Town Clerk Debra Smith and Zoning Administrator Tim Lung were also in attendance.

CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE Mayor Weaver called the meeting of the Mayor and Council to order at 6:00 PM with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Councilmember Waters followed by a moment of silence.

OLD BUSINESS

Well Drilling Project Bid Update – the County Commissioners approved the only submitted bid from Negley's Well Drilling, Inc. for the total sum of \$122,874.00. The new well will be drilled at the towns water storage tank and will be used as a supplemental drinking water supply The County has allocated \$330,000 in funding for this project with the Town of Sharpsburg to pay 50% of the total project cost.

Atlantic Security System Service Agreement for Parks—President Rick Toms from Atlantic Security attended the January meeting to explain the two-(2) plan options available for the security cameras in the parks. Plan A includes an annual cleaning and test of the system as well as a warranty on parts and labor. Plan B is for the annual cleaning and test of the equipment only, no warranty coverage with this plan. Council still had the following questions before deciding on a plan:

- How long is the warranty good for?
- What happens is the parts become obsolete?
- Who pays for replacement parts or upgrades?

Debbie will contact Rick Toms and obtain the answers for the March meeting. (ACTION ITEM)

Lutheran Cemetery Status – Mayor Weaver stated that he would like to see a Friends of the Lutheran Cemetery be created to maintain the cemetery. Councilmember Parsons stated that this is something that she would be interested in with her background. She also added that she would like to see a joint Friends group be created for both the Lutheran Cemetery and the Boyer House. (ACTION ITEM)

Boyer House Update - Mayor Weaver reviewed the current draft sales agreement between SHAF and the Town for the Boyer House at the January meeting and emailed the Council the final documents for comments and requested a final vote. Vice-Mayor Martz and Councilmembers Beeler, Kudla and Martz voting yes and no response from Councilmembers Hammond and Parsons. Final vote 4-2. The final agreement will be presented at the March meeting. (ACTION ITEM)

Alley Naming and Signage - Mayor Weaver asked how many of the Council were in favor of naming the alleys. 5-1 were in favor. Mayor Weaver requested meeting prior minutes where alley names were suggested for the March meeting. (ACTION ITEM)
