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The Amazing Odyssey of the Mumma Bible


(Editor's Note: It's hard to imagine that at 73 years, this Bible's remarkable journey completely eluded my own voyage in the pursuit of the history of this place. It was last Fall when one of my fellow "gym rats", who is also a docent on Antietam Battlefield, asked me if I knew if the Mumma Bible was in German. "What's the Mumma Bible?", I asked. That began a personal journey that resulted in this article. By the way, the Bible is in English, as you'll see.)

The story opens at the Dunker¹ Church, a mile or so north of town. Congregant Daniel Miller had provided the Bible to the congregation 1851 and it was placed in the brightly whitewashed Church on its completion in 1853. It might have rested there until today had fate, catastrophe of war, and a series of remarkable events not intervened.



On the morning of September 17, 1862,

Dunker Church stood on the Confederate extreme left. It's dazzling white exterior in the morning sunlight made a convenient visual focus for the initial Federal attack. The dawn attack and savage counterattack came to be known as the Cornfield Action. Later that day, the Church and surrounding area was enveloped in the West Woods Action. This Church, its congregation devoted to Peace, witnessed one of the heaviest scenes of bloodshed in the Civil War.



On the afternoon of that same day, Dunker Church was made into a field hospital, along with dozens of other nearby churches, barns, and homes. It was to be a surgery/hospital for weeks after the Battle. In addition, the adjacent fields were used as temporary burial grounds. Through all this, the

Mumma Bible was openly displayed in the Church, witnessing the bloody surgery and preparing the scene for its journey.

Corporal (one account records 'Sergeant') Nathan Dykeman 107th Regiment², Company H, New York State Volunteers "removed" the Bible from the Church on September 28, 1862.

Dykeman, the Regiment, and the Bible then went on a harrowing journey over the next three years. The Regiment was engaged in all the familiar battles we know from the history of the Army of the Potomac (e.g., Antietam, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, dozens more), but then took a most remarkable turn. In October 1863, the 107th was transferred to the Army of the Cumberland and was thus

engaged in all the major actions in the South: Siege of Atlanta, March to the Sea; Siege of Savannah, and many more.

Corporal Dykeman and the 107th ended their war by marching with all three Federal Armies past the White House in the Grand Review³ on May 24, 1865. (It's possible that the Bible was in Dykeman's pack as he marched in this parade, the most famous parade in American history!)

Dykeman (and the 107th Regiment) was eager to return home after three years of war and Dunker Church. He was literate and kept a lilooked forward to mustering out and getting back to Mill Point, NY. They all marched happily to Bladensburg, MD, to board the train home and in a moment of inattention, Corporal Dykeman walked in front of a moving locomotive and was killed. A friend in the Regiment took his possessions, and the stolen Bible, home to Mill Point and into the care of Dykeman's sister. Sadly, we do not have her name.

This Corporal and this Bible had tramped through mud, exhaustion, hunger, disease, all weathers, and deadly Confederate iron and lead and was finally to find rest in New York State, right? No! This story isn't even half over!

In 1903, Dykeman's sister sold the Bible to the Regiment's post-war reunion organization. The old 107th took the decision to try and re-

turn the bible to that far away and long ago (38 years) Dunker Congregation. But how?

Then someone in the Regiment remembered that a Dunker lived nearby who might be able to help.

At this point, the story careens off the rails and melds completely into another narrative, but hang in there with me!

That Dunker who was asked to help contact Sharpsburg's Dunkers (they had by then become the Brethren) was John T. Lewis, an African American, a freeman. There are many articles written about Lewis in African American literature in which the Mumma Bible is a mere footnote. As you will see his story veers into American Literature, too.

But I get ahead of myself...

John T. Lewis was born in 1835 in Linwood, MD and had an early introduction to the brary of books on many subjects, not just religious ones.

As a young man, he went north and first settled near Gettysburg, PA, but with the uncertainty of the status of African Americans, he headed farther north, to Elmira, NY. He worked as a farm laborer, but eventually married a freed slave woman and with her built a

produce growing business.

On August 23, 1877, Lewis was returning to his farm with a load of manure in his two-horse wagon when he saw a runaway buggy with three passengers careening down the hill towards him, about to

crash over the hill. Lewis leapt from his wagon and brought the run-away team to a halt. The occupants of the buggy were part of a local wealthy family. The author Mark Twain had married into that wealthy family and was visiting there. Some accounts relate that Twain witnessed the event! It is believed by many American Literature authorities that John T. Lewis was Twain's inspiration for "Jim" in the "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn."

Lewis, reading through church periodicals, was able to locate and contact the pastor of

the Sharpsburg Dunker (by then, Brethren) community, the Elder John E. Otto. We have John Otto's words, he wrote...

"Sharpsburg, Dec. 4th, 1903

"This Bible was taken from the Church after the Battle of Antietam by Sergeant Nathan F. Dykeman, September 28, 1862, Regt. 107, Co. H., N.Y.S.V. He is now dead and it fell into the hands of his afflicted sister. She presented it to the Company at their reunion this fall 1903 for which they gave her ten dollars.

"Their desire was to send it back to its home in the Brethren Church at Antietam Battlefield if it was still in existence. Through the kindness of Brother John T. Lewis, Elmira, N. Y., they received my

The Bible had come home. You MIGHT think its journey had ended. You would be **WRONG!**

Although in that moment, the 'new" Brethren Church had been built, the Bible was restored to the mostly unused old Dunker Church. Souvenir hunters had taken bricks from it and there were large holes in the walls. It was thought that the Church would be broken into and the Bible be stolen again. It was removed for safekeeping to Fahrney-Keedy Home, Mapleville, MD, and was taken out for special occasions, such as on the 75th

anniversary of the Battle.

It then passed into the possession of Mr. and Mrs. Newton Long of Baltimore, MD. Long was a grandson of the Elder Long who had read from it on September 14, 1862, the Sunday before the Battle. (They heard the thunder of the Battle of South Mountain as he read!) Mrs. Long was the great-granddaughter of Daniel Miller, the original donor of the Mumma Bible.

For obscure reasons, the Bible was then given into the temporary care of the Dr. and Mrs. Walter Shealy⁴, Sharpsburg's town physician and wife. At this point, its journey enters the haze of history. Some accounts feature it passing through the hands of the Washington County Historical Society. Today, it resides in the collection of

the Dunker Church's current custodians, Antietam National Battlefield park.

The history of our small place is filled with remarkable narratives like that of the Mumma Bible. As with all history, this one is filled with gaps. The Editor's biggest puzzle is how it came to be called the "Mumma" Bible for none of that family is found in the

family is found in the narrative.

¹ Established in Germany in 1708, the Dunkers were members of the German Baptist

Brethren sect who adhered to a literal interpretation of the New Testament. Though similar to other sects like the Quakers, Amish, and Mennonites in their beliefs, the Dunkers distinguished themselves by their total immersion "dunking" method of baptism, through which they received their name.

- ² The 107th was organized at Elmira, NY, in the counties of Chemung, Schuyler and Steuben several months before Antietam for three years of duty.
- ³ The Grand Review of the Armies was a military procession and celebration in Washington, DC, on May 23–24, 1865, following the Union victory. Elements of the Union Army in the United States Army paraded through the streets of the capital to receive accolades from the crowds and reviewing politicians, officials, and prominent citizens, including United States President Andrew Johnson, a month after the assassination President Abraham Lincoln.
- ⁴ There are many still living who remember Dr. Walter Shealy. The Editor was himself delivered into his hands in 1950.

his wife Jan until her passing. The 2025 Edition of Town Crier will be devoted to Ernie's memory and the January feature article




will be a more complete remembrance.


