"After I shot him down, all I wanted to do was get the Hell out of there...": Hugh David Chapman, WWII Pilot, Sharpsburg Boy

Then he added, "...in case his seven playmates came back looking for me."

Those were the words of then Lt. Hugh Chapman, Army Air Force. They were from a tantalizing scrap of newspaper found in the Sharpsburg Library. The article is dated June 7, 1944 from a newspaper called "The Independent".

Building the story of Hugh David Chapman was a frustrating one. The Editor spoke to several of his descendants, but they were only able to add a few details. By far, the most interesting information came from on-line resources, notably the on-line offerings of the American Air Museum of Britain, and some memories of his contemporaries, including the Editor's mother.

He was born on December 12, 1920 the son of the town's Lutheran Minister, The Reverend Lemuel H. D. Chapman and Mrs. Clara M. E. Chapman. He was the third of their five children and attended Gettysburg College.

Some of the narrative is part of Sharpsburg lore. The Editor's mother graduated from high school in 1944. She and other young women were enthralled by this handsome and educated older young man about the town. Imagine also their thrill of personally knowing a fighter pilot!

We are lucky to have his after-action report in which he claimed his first "kill", the one he spoke of in the newspaper. You will notice it's in a more formal presentation. Some text was removed to simplify the narrative. The Editor uses parentheses and italics to interpret the military jargon. In that moment the 376th Fighter Squadron were flying the P-47 'Thunderbolt'".

THE E/A WERE REPORTED AS BEING AT ABOUT 15,000 FEET SO WE DOVE TO APPROXIMATELY THAT ALTITUDE. ON THE WAY DOWN, I SAW SEVERAL PAR-ACHUTES AND THEN A GROUP OF ABOUT 20 FW 190'S(Focke Wulf 190s4) AT OUR TEN O'CLOCK SAME LEVEL.

HAVING ADVANTAGE IN SPEED, WE BROKE INTO THEM AND THEY IN TURN BROKE THRU US HEAD ON. IN THE ME-LEE(a violent and confused swirl of fighting fighter aircraft) I FOUND MYSELF SEPA-RATED FROM THE FLIGHT AND SOME DISTANCE FROM INITIAL ENCOUNTER.

I NOTICED A SMALL GROUP OF PLANES ABOUT TWO MILES AHEAD AND

TION, OPENING AT 300 CLOSING TO 100 YARDS, OBSERVING MANY STRIKES ALONG LEFT WING ROOT AND FUSE-LAGE. ON THE SECOND BURST, CANO-PY WAS EITHER JETTISONED OR BLOWN OFF.

VERY LITTLE EVASIVE ACTION WAS TAKEN AND I BELIEVE IT WAS DUE EI-THER TO PILOT INJURY OR SEVERE DAMAGE TO E/A. THEN CLOSING RAP-IDLY. I WAS FORCED TO BREAK(turn) UP AND TO THE RIGHT.

AT THAT MOMENT THE PILOT BAILED OUT AND E/A FELL OFF INTO A SPIN. JUST AS PILOT OF E/A BAILED OUT. I NOTICED A BLUE NOSE(an identifying paint scheme) P-51 MARKED HO-F DIV-ING DOWN, SEEING PILOT BAILED OUT, HE JOINED ME AND WE CROSSED OUT (departed) TOGETHER. COMPANY WAS APPRECIATED.

In the last year of the war, 376th Fighter Squadron transferred to the P-51 Mustang, capable of accompanying heavy bombers deep into Germany. There's a puzzle. His P-51 was named "Clara Ann" as you see in the photo. One initially assumes that he named it for his mom. However, his mom was "Clara Mabel". Who in the world was "Clara Ann"? Hugh Chapman went on to down three more Luftwaffe aircraft for a total of four. Had Germany held out another month, he could have claimed five "kills" and Ace status.

During WWII, he earned the Air Medal with 3 oak leaf clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross with 1 oak leaf cluster. The European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal: World War II, and the Victory Medal.

He also was the center of another piece of town lore in 1947. He was in that moment a flight commander in a National Air Guard unit

and their flight plan took them near Sharpsburg. Hugh decided to buzz his hometown. They approached from the east and when they crossed Cemetery Hill, throttled up creating a sudden and tremendous roar at treetop level. The Editor's mother witnessed this. She said. "Little old ladies fell down; chickens didn't lay for a week!". Somebody got a tail number is to identify specific targets that will allow us and (now) Captain Chapman had to answer for the outrage!

Hugh Chapman went on to serve an entire career in U.S.Air Force, retiring as Major and retired to Sharpsburg. On June 3, 1982, he died of injuries inflicted by a horse at his home right here in town. His remains rest nearby in Mountain View Cemetery.

¹ An internet search does not reveal any nearby local newspaper of that name.

² The P-47 was the largest single seater aircraft in any unit of WWII. It was robust, powerful, and heavily armed, if at the expense of some maneuverability. It had the reputation of surviving enemy encounters and bringing its pilot home.

³ The Messerschmitt 109 was one of the most advanced German fighter aircraft when introduced in 1937. Although by 1944 it was still dangerous if somewhat outdated. Further, it still formed the backbone of the German Air Arm (Luftwaffe). Nearly 34,000 were built.

⁴ Another, more advanced and dangerous German fighter.



Artifact of the Month: Oath of Allegiance: Dr. Augustin A. Biggs

Through a generous donation from Ms. Bonnie Hawker, the Sharpsburgh Museum of History recently acquired some locally significant items from Boonsborough Museum of History. Among them was this extraordinary document, an Oath of Allegiance signed my Sharpsburg's prominent physician during the Civil War, Dr. Augustin Biggs.

Director of the Boonsborough Museum, Mr. Stephen Recker, can shed no light on why Dr. Biggs was required to take this oath. Dr. Biggs conduct in service to the dire needs of the people of this town during and after the town's greatest challenge was exemplary and took a great personal toll on him. Why was he required to sign it? Was he suspected of Secessionist inclinations? Were all prominent Sharpsburg citizens required to swear allegiance? Did he attend to Confederate sick and wounded? However the facts, this document is a town treasure and embodies that catastrophic moment in our history.



Oath of Allegiance

I the undersigned of Washington County, State of Maryland do hereby solemnly swear before Almighty God that I will bear true allegiance to the United States and support and sustain the constitution and laws thereof - that I will maintain the national sovereignty paramount to that of the state,

county, or corporate powers that I will discourage, discountenance and forever oppose Secession, rebellion, and the disintegration of the federal union(??) - that I will disclaim and denounce all faith and fellowship with the socalled confederate states and confederate armies and pledge my property(?) and my life to the sound performance of this my solemn Allegiance to the government of the United States - so help me God: subscribed and sworn to on this 15th day of November 1862 at Sharpsburg before me

Leut. Provost Marshal
(signed) Augustin A Biggs





SHARPSBURG MAYOR AND COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MINUTES August 5, 2024

The Mayor and Council of Sharpsburg, MD held their monthly meeting on Monday, August 5, 2024 in the Council meeting room of Town Hall located at 106 E. Main Street in Sharpsburg. In attendance were Mayor Russell Weaver, Vice Mayor Jacob Martz, Councilmembers Ed Beeler, Robbie Waters, John Hammond and Mia Parsons. Zoning Administrator Tim Lung was present via zoom. Council Member Joe Kudla and Town Clerk Debra Smith was absent

CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE Mayor Weaver called the meeting to order at 6:00PM with the pledge and a moment of silence in remembrance of Buster Crampton.

GUESTS/CITIZENS COMMENTS -

Citizenship Award – Mike Arant was recognized for exceptional service to the citizens of Sharpsburg in providing 3.5 years of local news through the Town Crier.

 Volunteerism – Mayor Weaver stated that October 5th is Sharpsburg Days and would like to create a Community Development Committee.

Huntzberry Brothers, Inc. - Analysis and Short and Long Term Street/Alley Repair CIP Proposal – Brad Huntzberry and Brady Blair presented the results of a study which determined the conditions of the towns streets and alleys that was done both by visual inspection and aerially by drone. Stating that they found nothing in the town that would be deemed critical, areas of Alley 10, S. Church Street and Chapline Street were considered at medium risk and should be repaired within a 5-yr period. The annual maintenance method of Crack-Fill was recommended to be done on an annual basis. Mayor Weaver requested that the study be revised based on the discussion of priority areas and re-submitted to the Town Administrator who will create a 5 and 10 year CIP Plan to be discussed in December. Huntzberry Brothers study is incorporated as part of these minutes.

- Reviewing Maryland Department of Planning Annual Report filing form. When complete, will forward to the Planning Commission for approval.

- Responded to several inquiries regarding zoning and permitting requirement questions.
- Reviewed email/ letter regarding approval of MHT/MHAA grant for Big Spring restoration. Corresponded with Gruber-Latimer regarding time frame and permitting process. Corresponded with MDE to restart permitting process. Reviewing Water Way Construction Permit application procedure.
- Received recommendation from Planning Commission regarding proposed Zoning text amendments to define two
 different types of home occupation business (attached). Based on the Planning Commission's recommendation to
 NOT change the existing wording, requesting Council direction to drop the proposal or move forward with the
 Text amendment. Dropping the proposal would reactivate the current Zoning violation occurring on West Main
 Street
- Attended Md. Dept of Planning virtual meeting regarding the update to the State's Land Use/Land Cover mapping.
 Have been reviewing the map for Sharpsburg and will be making comments.
- Received an inquiry from the American Battlefield Trust, owner of the "Avery House" at 124 High St. They are
 proposing to rent the house to, "the Antietam Group and maybe Save Antietam Foundation". "Those groups
 would use the house as the base for their operations, offices, and sometimes host tours or volunteer events.
 Responded that the property is located in the County and that the County would have jurisdiction over Zoning
 compliance, etc.; however, a change of use from residential would require review and approval by the Town if
 access is proposed to High Street.
- Reviewed an application and issued a Zoning Permit for a fence on property at 109 S. Church Street.
- Received and reviewed a letter from the Md. Dept. of Planning regarding HB 538 Housing Expansion and Affordability Act (attached). Town zoning appears to be in compliance with the act; however, there may be ramifications associated with property owned by a nonprofit allowing residential destiny bonus for "affordable housing". Tim will clarify the definition of a "Mobile Home" and bring it back for further discussion at the September meeting. ACTION ITEM
- Received notice that the County is updating its Web Map application that the Town uses and links on its website.
 Will be reviewing the updated application and will send comments to the County.
- Issued 10-day code violation notice for tall grass/weeds on property to the rear of E. Antietam Street. Tim to
 contact property owner and obtain a commitment and move forward with issuance of a citation.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Revised Alley Naming Proposal – Mayor Weaver stated that the additional alley names have been added so that every alley that has a house on it will also have a name. he proposed names are as follows;

Alley 1 – Biggs Alley

Alley 4 – Tolsons Alley Alley 5 – Garrison Spring Alley Alley 10 – Clipp Alley Trading Post Alley McNally Alley Alley 9 to Spyders Landing Rd.

Alley 9 to Snyders Landing Rd – Councilmembers Hammond and Parsons stated that it is used frequently by outfitters., Also suggested was making this alley one-way going north, which will be placed on the September agenda for public discussion. (ACTION ITEM)

Well Drilling Update - Mayor Weaver stated that the new bid will be out next week and he will make sure that Phillips & Son Drilling get a copy of the bid.

Town Hall/Library Hand Rail-ADA Ramp Replacement Update- Council Member Hammond proposed a full demolition and replacement of the ADA ramp in front of the town hall/library at the May 6th meeting. Mayor Weaver stated that because this will be an expensive project, a funding committee may need to be created with financial assistance from both the County and the library. The discussion continued at this meeting after Frederick Seibert and Associates (FSA) were asked to review the matter. Vice-Mayor Martz read the report details stating that in order to make the current ramp ADA compliant, it would have to be extended another 5' into the alley and change the slope to meet the 8.33% of grade which is currently at 10%. Also recommended was obtaining an architect due to ADA requirements. He then proposed that the hand rail be replaced and automatic door closers be placed on the buildings and leave the remainder as is. Councilmember Hammond said that he would not agree to the door closers because they don't hold up. Mayor Weaver stated that his major concern is what ADA modifications will do to the front of the building and if the matter is pushed, the library will be responsible for 90% of the cost since 90% of the people that come in this building are going to the library. After a lengthy discussion on the issue, Mayor Weaver proposed to table the matter adding that the project is not complaint driven and Councilmembers Hammond and Parsons are the only ones wanting to do this project. Councilmember Hammond made a motion to do nothing on the project. There was no second. Councilmember waters agreed that it should be done, but at what cost; i.e. modifying the front sidewalk, the flower beds, the alley. Motion by Councilmember Waters to hire a private ADA Specialist/Contractor, second by Councilmember Hammond. Motion carried. Councilmember Hammond will take the lead on the project. (ACTION ITEM)

Motion by Councilmember Waters, second by Councilmember Parsons to adjourn the meeting at 8:00 PM. Motion carried.

Meet the Author - John Schildt & "Roads to Antietam"

Roads to Antietam is the story of two armies marching to battle in September 1862 and what that experience was like for the men in the ranks and the civilians along the routes. Soldiers from the North and South wondered where they were going as they marched along the roads of Maryland. What would Lee do? What was McClellan's plan? Frederick and Hagerstown lay ahead, but what was beyond? None of them could anticipate their bloody meeting on the fields around Sharpsburg, Maryland, and on the banks of Antietam Creek. John Schildt's reprinted 1985 classic of the Road to Antietam depicts the feelings and actions of those who participated in those stirring events of the Maryland Campaign.

Reverend John Schildt hardly needs an introduction. John's first book,

September Echoes, published in 1960, was the first on Antietam since Francis
Palfrey in 1887. John has been a lecturer and guide of Antietam since 1958.

Since then, 2,000 additional tours have followed. John has written over thirty-five
books relating the various aspects of the Maryland Campaign of 1862 and local
history. This list includes Drums along the Antietam, Four Days in October,

Islands of Mercy, and Roads to Gettysburg.
