Max Swain: His Heartbreaking Death and the Extraordinary Journey of His Remains Not all Christmas Stories are Merry.

It was 80 years ago during one of the coldest European winters in a century. It was this very time of year.

On December 16, 1944, the German Wehrmacht mounted a desperate attack on Allied Forces as they hunkered down in the cold and the snow of the quiet Ardennes Forest in Belgium. We call it the Battle of the Bulge because of the swelling on the map the front made into Allied lines. It is thought by historians to be the second largest battle, after the Normandy Invasion six months earlier, ever experienced by American forces. Germany hoped to split the Allied armies, force peace negotiation, boost German morale, and delay the advance into the Fatherland. It ended in disaster for them but not before visiting destruction on the Allies.

Max Swain was killed five days after the launch of the attack. He and his comrades were overrun and surrounded by German artillery thunder in every direction; they must have thought the war was lost. But I get ahead of myself.

Born in 1924, into a local family (Swain/DeLauney) and

lived the normal life of a young man in the time. He was the son of Mary (DeLauney) and Clifford Swain. He was the son of a grocer. He was a model -maker. His close relatives relate the story that at the outbreak of World War II he wanted to enlist in the U.S. Army Air Corps. It was not to be.

Max was assigned to a Heavy Weapons Company (Company H, 423rd Regiment, 106th Infantry Division) as a Staff Sergent and had three mortar squads under him. After three days of fighting, they had run out of ammunition and were cut off from any hope of resupply nor even rescue. Desperate to try and find a way out and assuming they were to-

tally surrounded, the regimental commander instructed Max's squads to attempt to find an escape route to the west and the American/British lines. Max was in the passenger's seat of the lead of three Jeeps when


they encountered German machine guns. According to an eyewitness account from a man who was in the vehicle directly behind him, Max was killed instantly and most of the men in the second and third Jeeps were wounded and taken prisoner. The entire unit surrendered en masse shortly after Max was killed. Max was initially listed as Missing in Action, and then in February 1946, the Army officially declared him dead. It was known then as a Finding of Death (i.e.; presumed dead, no body recovered).

This is where the story of his missing remains take a near miraculous turn.

Max's body was discovered by the caretaker of a German soldier's cemetery near Bleialf, Germany in July 1947, some distance from the site of his death in Belgium. The only identification the corpse had was the book of addresses that his mother, Mary, had given him. The caretaker contacted his son-in-law, still a POW in England, about how to proceed. The son-in-law received permission to contact the Mayor of Hagerstown. That started a series of events.

Max was reburied in a military cemetery in Belgium and then in June 1949, his remains were finally returned home to be buried in the Antietam National Cemetery. You may visit him there. When you enter the cemetery, look to the left at the end of the first row of gravestones. Max's stone is the bright white one on the very left.

The family still has the letter that the caretaker's son-in-law sent to the Mayor of Hagerstown.



Here is the text.

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Broughton Hall
Broughton
nr(near?) Skipton
Yorkshire
England
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To whom it may concern,

I am a German prisoner of war working in England at the above address. My father-in-law has written from Germany to say that he has discovered the grave of 6 American soldiers. On one of these soldiers was an identity pocket-book bearing the inscription S/Sgt. Maxwell L. Swain.

112 So Cannonn Avenue

Hagerstown MD

My father in law has reburied the bodies in separate graves in the village of Bleialf. The graves are now well cared for and my two children put flowers on them each week.

My family wonder if this is the first information you have received of S/Sgt. Maxwell L. Swain.

My father in law has reported this to the French Military Government but he does not know if they took it further. If you want to write to him his address is as follows:

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French zone

If you require he will try to get you a photograph of the grave. But as things are very difficult in Germany now it might take some time.

Imagine how nearly miraculous it is that two men who were on the other side of the conflict and who had nothing to gain took steps to return Max's remains to his parents and the nation. More miraculous still is that we know their names, Josef Linden and Michel Blum.

As with all narratives, there are tantalizing gaps. For example, who transported the bodies across the Belgian border into Germany for mass and anonymous burial? Was it the Germans wanting to conceal American remains? After all, the Malmedy Massacre¹ had occurred four days before Max's death.

These events give us an opportunity to contemplate the human tragedy of war and especially the brutal events of December 1944 and



into January 1945. This is the second Crier article that relates a sad story about the Swain family, see also the June 2023 installment.

¹ - The Malmedy Massacre was one of several war crimes committed against American units during the Bulge. At Malmedy eighty-four American POWs were killed rather than being sent to POW camps. It is thought that Hitler communicated his policy that the "noprisoners" strategy then being used by them against the Russians was to be used during this offensive against Allied soldiers.

Mark your calendars! On Thursday, February 20th at 6:00pm the Sharpsburg Library and the Antietam Institute will co-host the "Meet the Authors of the Commanders of Antietam" event.

The event will be held in McKinley Hall at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Sharpsburg. Come on out to meet the editors, ,Kevin Pawlak and Brad Gottfried as well as a number of the contributors of the book. The authors will briefly discuss the book, their favorite commander they wrote about, and be on hand afterwards to sign your copy.

Books will also be available for purchase.

The "Commanders of Antietam" takes a unique approach by providing a biography of every (191) brigade, division, and corps/wing commanders in the infantry, cavalry, and artillery in the Union Army of the Potomac and the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia. Each section is divided into three parts: Before the Maryland Campaign, The Maryland Campaign, and After the Maryland Campaign,. The 44 expert authors drew heavily on first-person accounts and primary sources to weave a compelling story about each commander at Antietam.

Kevin Pawlak and Brad Gottfried are the editors of this volume. It is the third in a series of books focused on different aspects of the campaign, including "Brigades of Antietam" (edited by Bradley Gottfried) and "Artillery of Antietam" (by James A. Rosebrock), both published by the Antietam Institute.

SHARPSBURG VOLUNTEER FIRE CO. 2024 FUND DRIVE



Happy Holidays from the Sharpsburg Volunteer Fire Company! As volunteers of SVFC, we are dedicated to making our community the best possible place to live, visit, play, and work, providing over 24,500 hours of service in 2024. The SVFC continues to adapt and grow, standing ready to protect and help the community in times of need, but we need your help. Since 1943, the SVFC has been responsible for protecting approximately 6,800 residents spread across 40 square miles. In 2024, we will respond to approximately 740 emergency calls for fire, rescue, and advanced life support. We have a team of around 50 active responders, consisting of highly trained volunteers and career staff. Our main goals are to save lives, minimize losses, and ensure the safety of our community. As the regional response center for Southern Washington County, our station is staffed 24 hours a day, providing emergency responses not only to our community but also to neighboring areas, which increases our coverage to 60,000 residents.

In order to maintain our level of service delivery, we need \$320,000 for the fiscal year 2025. The Washington County Government provides \$220,000 of support, but we still need to raise \$100,000 from our local community. We rely on various sources of funding such as this fund-drive, fundraising events, grants, donations, and gaming proceeds. The annual fund-drive is our biggest and most dependable source of local funding, covering 30% of our needs. Unfortunately, over the past 3 years, only 18.2% of residents have made donations. We request each individual residence donate at least \$50, and families donate \$75 if possible. Your contribution will go a long way in saving lives and improving the quality of life in our community.

2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 2024, SVFC made significant strides, including reducing its ISO rating from 9/6 to 4, upgrading key equipment like the Brush Truck and Engine Tanker, and adding a pitched roof to the annex. The department deployed new PPE, portable radios, and rescue tools, while certifying six new volunteers and logging over 1,500 hours of state and national training. Local training exceeded 2,500 hours, and the company provided safety education to 350+ residents. SVFC restored a 1964 Engine, donated equipment to hurricane-affected departments in North Carolina, and ordered a new Engine Tanker for 2028. Other improvements included resurfacing the station floor and adding an SCBA filling station.





COMING IN 2025

In 2025, SVFC plans to replace outdated fire hoses and nozzles, and add a station exhaust filtering system to improve air quality. The department will continue deploying upgraded equipment and focus on extensive responder training, alongside ongoing fire prevention efforts. Additionally, the company aims to develop new firefighting and rescue techniques to enhance its operational effectiveness.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?



The rising costs in the fire and rescue field pose a significant challenge for small communities like ours. SVFC is currently saving money to replace our 1998 engine tanker at a cost of \$1.3 million. Although 55% of this cost is covered by a federal grant the additional 45% must be provided by SVFC. We are also making improvements to our facilities. The funds raised through our fundraising efforts will be directly allocated to these projects.
